This work attempts to understand the emergence of Postmodernism through its relationship to Modernism while examining the discursive dimension of the two movements. The goal of this thesis is not aimed at determining to what extent Postmodernism was necessary or avoidable, definable or unintelligible, real or merely fictive. In deference to Michael Focult's Archeology of Knowledge, it examines the reasons and conditions of its


emergence, identifying the sites of continuity and rupture between Modernism and Postmodernism and studying the discursive formations within Modernism that facilitated the appearance of Postmodernism. It carries out this investigation through the writings of Jencks and in reference to three distinct yet overlapping phases that mark their evolving relationship; representing, defining and classifying.
